**Strong:** Fast fashion's rapid production cycles lead to textile waste, water pollution, and exploitative labor conditions, demonstrating how consumer culture prioritizes profit over sustainability.

**Weak:** World War I had many causes.

**Strong:** Although nationalist tensions and alliance systems created conflict conditions, immediate military mobilization plans transformed a regional crisis into total war.

**Weak:** The Civil Rights Movement was important.

**Strong:** The Civil Rights Movement succeeded not through single heroic figures but through strategic grassroots organizing, economic boycotts, and federal legal intervention.

**Weak:** The Industrial Revolution changed society.

**Strong:** The Industrial Revolution's urbanization and factory systems created unprecedented wealth while simultaneously producing child labor, slums, and worker exploitation.

**Weak:** Ancient Rome was powerful.

**Strong:** Rome maintained empire through military conquest, strategic infrastructure investment, and cultural assimilation that granted conquered peoples paths to citizenship.

**Weak:** Vaccines are beneficial.

**Strong:** Widespread vaccination programs demonstrate that individual immunity choices affect community health, making public health policy necessary despite personal freedom concerns.

**Weak:** Exercise is good for you.

**Strong:** Regular exercise reduces chronic disease risk through improved cardiovascular function, metabolic regulation, and stress hormone reduction, making it preventive medicine.

**Weak:** Artificial intelligence will change jobs.

**Strong:** AI automation threatens routine cognitive work while creating demand for creative problem-solving skills, requiring education systems to prioritize adaptability over memorization.

**Weak:** Plastic pollution harms oceans.

**Strong:** Ocean plastic accumulation disrupts marine food chains, releases toxic chemicals, and returns to human consumption through seafood, creating a closed contamination loop.

---

## Political/Policy

**Weak:** Minimum wage should be raised.

**Strong:** Although minimum wage increases may reduce entry-level positions, they decrease worker poverty and stimulate local economies through increased consumer spending power.

**Weak:** Privacy is important online.

**Strong:** Corporate data collection's predictive algorithms manipulate consumer behavior and political opinions, threatening democratic autonomy beyond individual privacy violations.

**Weak:** College should be free.

**Strong:** While tuition-free college increases accessibility, it requires progressive tax funding and quality control mechanisms to prevent dilution of educational standards.

**Weak:** Immigration affects the economy.

**Strong:** Immigration simultaneously fills labor shortages and creates wage competition, requiring nuanced policy that balances economic needs with worker protections.

## Thesis Checklist

### Your thesis must:

- ☐ Make a specific, debatable claim (not a fact)
- ☐ Preview your main supporting reasons
- ☐ Take a clear position (avoid "maybe" or "might")
- ☐ Be 1-2 sentences maximum
- ☐ Appear at the end of your introduction
- ☐ Be specific enough to guide your essay structure
- ☐ Answer "So what?" - show why it matters

### Red Flags (Avoid):

- ✗ Announcing: "In this essay, I will discuss..."
- ✗ Questions: "Is social media harmful?"
- ✗ Obvious facts: "Shakespeare wrote plays."
- ✗ Being vague: "Many factors contribute..."
- ✗ Personal opinion only: "I believe/think/feel..."
