# 1. Thesis Statement Criteria (0–20 Points)

#### **Excellent (17–20):**

- Clearly states a specific cause-and-effect relationship
- Accurately reflects the essay's content
- Uses precise, academic language
- Avoids absolute or oversimplified claims

#### Satisfactory (13–16):

- Thesis is present but may lack specificity
- Cause or effect may be stated vaguely
- Generally aligned with body paragraphs

#### **Needs Improvement (0–12):**

- Thesis is unclear, missing, or purely descriptive
- No clear causal claim is made

# 2. Evidence and Support Requirements (0–30 Points)

#### **Excellent (26–30):**

- Uses multiple credible sources
- Evidence clearly supports causal claims
- Effectively distinguishes correlation from causation
- Integrates quotes, data, and examples smoothly

#### Satisfactory (20–25):

- Evidence is relevant but uneven or limited
- Some claims lack full explanation
- Causal links are present but underdeveloped

### **Needs Improvement (0–19):**

- Insufficient, weak, or uncited evidence
- Relies on opinion or generalization
- Causal relationships are assumed rather than proven

# 3. Organization and Structure Expectations (0–25 Points)

#### **Excellent (22–25):**

- Clear block or chain structure used consistently
- Logical flow between paragraphs
- Strong topic sentences and transitions

#### Satisfactory (17–21):

- Organization is generally clear
- Occasional unclear transitions or mixed structure

#### **Needs Improvement (0–16):**

- Disorganized or inconsistent structure
- Ideas presented randomly
- Paragraph focus is unclear

# 4. Language and Mechanics Standards (0–15 Points)

#### **Excellent (13–15):**

- Formal, academic tone maintained
- Sentence structure is varied and clear

- Virtually no grammar, spelling, or punctuation errors
- Proper formatting and citation style

### Satisfactory (9-12):

- Meaning is clear despite minor errors
- Some inconsistencies in tone or mechanics

### **Needs Improvement (0–8):**

- Frequent grammar or punctuation errors
- Informal or unclear language
- Incorrect or missing formatting

# 5. Critical Thinking and Analysis (0–10 Points)

#### **Excellent (9–10):**

- Explains how and why causes produce effects
- Acknowledges complexity and alternative factors
- Demonstrates strong analytical depth

### Satisfactory (6–8):

- Analysis present but somewhat surface-level
- Limited engagement with competing explanations

#### Needs Improvement (0–5):

- Minimal analysis
- Essay summarizes rather than analyzes

- Revise lower-scoring areas before submission.
- Use point weights to prioritize high-impact improvements.
