# **Transition Words Guide for Cause and Effect Essays**

### 1. Cause Indicators

Use these transitions to explain why something happens.

#### **Common cause transitions:**

- because
- since
- due to
- owing to
- stems from
- arises from
- is caused by
- originates from
- results from

### **Usage examples:**

- Student performance declined because study time decreased.
- Sleep deprivation increased due to excessive screen time.
- Many urban problems **stem from** unequal access to resources.

### 2. Effect Indicators

Use these transitions to show what happens as a result of a cause.

#### **Common effect transitions:**

- therefore
- consequently
- thus
- as a result
- leads to
- results in
- produces
- causes

• brings about

### **Usage examples:**

- Students multitask during lectures; therefore, comprehension suffers.
- Increased stress results in lower academic motivation.
- Lack of regulation leads to widespread environmental damage.

### 3. Sequential Transitions

Use these transitions to show the order of causes and effects, especially in chain structure essays.

### **Common sequential transitions:**

- first
- initially
- next
- then
- subsequently
- afterward
- finally

### **Usage examples:**

- First, students experience information overload; then, attention levels decline.
- Economic pressure rises, and **subsequently**, consumer spending decreases.

### 4. Contrast Transitions

Use these transitions to acknowledge opposing ideas, limitations, or alternative explanations.

### **Common contrast transitions:**

- however
- although
- despite
- nevertheless
- on the other hand
- in contrast
- whereas

### **Usage examples:**

- Although social media offers connection, it can increase feelings of isolation.
- The policy reduced costs; however, it also lowered service quality.
- Despite technological growth, access remains unequal.

## 5. Tips for Effective Use

- Vary transition words to avoid repetition.
- Place transitions at the beginning of sentences or between clauses for clarity.
- Ensure each transition accurately reflects the relationship between ideas.
- Use contrast transitions to demonstrate critical thinking and depth of analysis.
