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## DESCRIPTIVE APPROACHES

Outside to Inside:

- External appearance first
- Then internal components

- Finally hidden features

Top to Bottom:

- Systematic visual scan
- Logical progression
- Complete coverage

Most to Least Important:

- Lead with defining feature
- Supporting details follow
- Minor elements last

Chronological Discovery:

- First thing you notice
- What reveals itself over time
- Hidden discoveries

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### **SENSORY CHECKLIST**

✓ Visual: colors, shapes, size, design ✓ Tactile: texture, weight, temperature ✓ Auditory: sounds produced ✓ Olfactory: scent or smell ✓ Functional: how it moves/operates

### **COMPARISON TOOLS**

- Similes: "smooth as glass"
- Metaphors: "a window to the past"
- Size comparisons: "size of a paperback"
- Familiar references: "like a vintage typewriter"

### **WRITING TIPS**

- Use specific nouns over vague adjectives
- Include exact measurements when helpful
- Describe flaws and imperfections

- Show object in use, not just static
- Connect physical traits to meaning
- Use technical terms appropriately
- Balance objective and subjective views
- Let details build emotional resonance
- Consider multiple perspectives
- End with why it matters
