### Alliteration Essentials: A Student's Guide to Sound Repetition

#### What Exactly IS Alliteration?

Alliteration is the **repetition of initial consonant sounds** in closely connected words. It's not about spelling—it's about SOUND. "Crazy kangaroos" is alliteration; "psycho cats" is also alliteration (both make the /k/ sound), even though they start with different letters.

**Key Concept:** It's **consonant sounds**, not just letters. "Honest hour" works (silent h in "honest" means both start with vowel sounds—that's actually assonance, not alliteration).

#### The Three Types of Alliteration:

1. **Direct/Consonantal:** Repetition of the same consonant sound ("Peter Piper picked")
2. **Sibilance:** Repetition of 's', 'sh', 'z', or soft 'c' sounds ("Silent sea snakes slither slowly")
3. **Aspirate:** Repetition of 'h' sounds ("He held his hope in his hands")

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### **Quick-Reference: Alliteration Do's & Don'ts**

#### **DO:**

- Use to emphasize important elements

- Match sounds to mood/tone
- Read aloud to test flow
- Vary intensity based on genre
- Consider sound, not just spelling

**DON'T:**

- Overuse to the point of distraction
- Force it where it doesn't fit
- Sacrifice clarity for sound
- Use only one sound repeatedly
- Ignore the difference between letters and sounds
